GATEWAY FOR NEW, UNEXPLORED, AMAZING WINTER EXPERIENCES




Combining the charms of both Europe and Asia, Azerbaijan is a country of surprising contrasts, hospitable people and epic landscapes. From historic and traditional experiences to modern-day escapades, this fast-growing destination offers countless experiences all leading to untold tales and adventures. Home to 9 out of 11 distinct climatic zones, the landscape offers diverse scenery with everything from city to beaches, forests, and lush and snowy mountains. In fact, the mountains of Azerbaijan are transformed into a white paradise every winter, offering a magical experience for both those seeking adventure and those looking for a dose of rest and relaxation. Set amidst the Caucasian mountains, the change of scenery with the most satisfying pistes for ski enthusiasts is just three hours away from the city centre.

In winter, Azerbaijan's mountains are irresistible for skiing enthusiasts. Breathtakingly beautiful, they are home to state-of-theart ski resorts with well-prepared slopes and first-class amenities. The dramatic landscapes make ski trips here unforgettable, while non-skiers can opt for numerous other activities such as riding a snowmobile, ziplining or snow tubing.

Perched atop the pristine mountains of the Gusar region, Shahdag Mountain Resort has a range of high-class hotels, open-air steam



pools, spas, restaurants, and an endless array of thrilling sports and leisure activities. The snow at Shahdag transforms it into one of the most stunning ski resorts in the Caucasus. Whether you are a beginner or an experienced skier, brave the slopes and enjoy over 17 kilometres of pistes. The nearby charming village of Laza is famous for its storied waterfalls which freeze into icefalls during the winter and become a popular site for ice climbing. Soon-to-beopened rollercoaster in Shahdag will definitely become a go-to place for the enthusiasts of extreme activities.

The village of Agbulag in the Shahbuz region, an hour's drive from Nakhchivan city, is home to the first all-round tourism infrastructure complex in Nakhchivan. This area has long been popular for agricultural tourism and relaxation in nature, attracting tourists with its pure air and clear weather. But the ski centre ensures there are now great travel opportunities throughout the year. At the centre you can not only go skiing, snowboarding or sledging, but



also enjoy the Lesser Caucasus Mountains scenery and try delicious local dishes. It has everything necessary to cater to tourists, including a hotel with 38 rooms.

With mountains accounting for over 60 per cent of Azerbaijan's total area, visitors can enjoy memorable moments hiking through the stunning landscape. One such village is Khinalig which is beautiful and peacefully isolated, so much so that its residents speak a little-known, unwritten language. The scenic route to Khinalig from the city of Guba opens to impressive views at every turn. But the photo opportunities do not stop there! Recently included in the UNESCO World Heritage Tentative list, the village is made up of 360

cobblestone houses built on top of one another 200-300 years ago: one house's roof is another family's courtyard! The settlement's 2,000 residents are warm, welcoming and eager to share with you their local dishes and homebrewed tea. To see all the village's best bits, reserve up to five hours of your day. Griz village is another popular destination in Guba region, located 2200 meters above the sea level. It is famous for its fascinating waterfall located up in the hills of Ag Dagh mountains. The waterfall freezes in winter and creates a breathtaking scenery, making it a perfect spot for nature admirers. In the region of Gakh, Ilisu village is also picturesque from every viewpoint and has paths to spectacular waterfalls and historical monuments.



Uganda's Unbeatable Wildlife The Big 7

A ptly termed the "The Pearl of Africa" Uganda is blessed with incredible natural beauty, brimming with thickly forested lands, vast expanses of savannahs and misty mountains that will satiate even the most discerning wildlife enthusiast, all whilst ensuring that every experience is framed from the ground up to minimize our human impact to ensure that generations to come fully enjoy the richness of its flora and fauna.

The "Big 5" a term coined in an age-old era indicated the 5 most challenging animals to track which were the African Lion, Leopard, Elephant, Rhinoceros and Cape buffalo. With the advent of modern transportation and experienced guides visitors are nearly guaranteed to spot the Big -5 in many of the country's 10 National Parks – the Queen Elizabeth Park amongst the most diverse of them all. The park's allure is drawn from its mix of habitats and eco-niches; the sight of majestic rare tree-climbing lions in the middle of a hunt is sharply contrasted with large buffalo and elephant herds that dominate the horizon. A number of options await visitors from walking safari's to a channel cruise along the game rich Kizanga river channel or a multi-night stay at one of the many riverside lodges that allow for sunset encounters with the majestic procession of wildlife that skirts its banks. Although Queen Elizabeth park is a fantastic primer for the new wildlife enthusiasts; far more awaits those who wish to experience the awe inspiring mountain gorilla and the wild chimpanzee – completing the "Big 7"

Uganda is home to almost half the world's surviving mountain gorillas; the Bwindi Impenetrable national parks – a UNESCO

world heritage site is where nearly 350 of the world's remaining 1100 gorillas live, amongst precipitous mountainous rainforests. Tracking gorillas is a truly challenging yet rewarding experience as these creatures live in dense undergrowth. Seasoned guides lead visitors up verges, across flowing rivers past thorny trees and vines in order to catch a glimpse of these creatures. In addition to these primates the park also hosts forest elephants, giant hogs and over 350 species of bird, including several seen nowhere else in the world which makes it a bird-watcher's dream come true.

North of Bwindi, Kibale National Park is believed to have the highest primate densities in Africa and the foremost destination to view wild chimpanzees – including the ultra-rare L'Hoest monkeys and the endangered red Colobus species. The park is a sensory feast with an amazing varied landscape, where grassland and swamps are interspersed with elevated plateaus. Incredibly it is said there are several groups of wild chimpanzees that are habituated to human contact for an intimate experience like no other. No visit is complete without a trip to yet another UNESCO heritage site the Rwenzori National Park a short trip east of Kibale. It is a haven for a number of rare plants, animals and birds some of which are still being discovered. The Rwenzori Mountains are a marvel in themselves with equatorial snow covered peaks along with lowlands blanketed in colourful mosses united with spectacular flora creating an idyllic dreamy ambience.

Feeling Vienna

Vienna is a capital of pleasure – just as diverse as the city itself are the possibilities for enjoying it to the fullest and with all the senses. After the privations of recent months, there is a great desire to indulge oneself again, to exploit everything to the fullest, and to break away from the monotony of everyday life.



HOW DOES VIENNA TASTE?

On the one hand, there are the culinary delights of Vienna that carry our palate through the city. From beisl to toque-winning restaurant, from hipster café to traditional coffee house and from street food to slow food. Viennese cuisine is the only type of cooking in the world to be named after a city. Many specialties have conquered the world, such as the Wiener schnitzel with the crispy, golden-yellow breadcrumbs in a cozy beisl or the aromatic apple strudel in the coffee house, whose interior seems to have originated in imperial times. Vienna's coffee house culture has been on UNES-CO's Intangible Cultural Heritage

List since 2011, but reaches far back to imperial times. The imperial and royal court confectioner Demel still serves Sisi's favorite sweet treat: candied violet petals.

GREEN VIENNA

Slowing down comes easily: half of the city is made up of green spaces. These are evident approx. every 250 meters in the form of a park or at least a piece of green. The rose garden in the Volksgarten is located in the city center and is a feast for the eyes and nose from spring to late autumn thanks to the 400 different varieties of flowering rose. Find a spot here, close your eyes, and let the city work its magic on you.

The Green Prater, which according to the magazine "Focus" is one of the ten best city parks in the world, covers an area of six million square meters. Although it is located only three linear kilometers from St. Stephen's Cathedral, nature is thriving in this area. Its vast lawns, woods, and water areas offer an ideal environment for relaxing strolls, brisk hikes, extended jogging tours, bicycle and skating trips, and much more.

HITS FOR KIDS

What do children expect from a sightseeing trip? Pretty much the same as the grownups do: Variety and entertainment. Many Viennese museums and organizers have therefore created programs that are fun for the entire family – The motto is "hands on."

The Austrian capital has plenty of space for action. Unlike many other major cities, Vienna boasts huge green areas where children can play to their hearts' content. But that is by no means all. Maybe a little princess would like to dance a minuet in a hooped skirt and old-fashioned bodice? Become a child artist? Stroke some snakes? No problem. Dive into the colorful adventure world of the Prater, Vienna's oldest and most popular amusement park, where 250 different stands and attractions wait for you. Or visit the oldest continuously operating zoo in the world -

Schönbrunn Zoo. Vienna is the perfect destination for every age!

KAILASH FESTIVALS



Aunique Kailash Valley, the remaining minority of approximately 3500 people living in three isolated but beautiful valleys known as Bumburet, Rambur, and Berir. The people of Kailash have a rich culture and are very strong footed about their identity. These people stand out from the remaining tribes, cultures, and communities due to their distinct traditions, religious practices, and festivals.

The people of Kailash celebrate many festivals during the year but notable festivals are three, the spring feast Chilam Joshi, in May, Uchal or Utchal, in August and Choimus, in winter. Chilam Joshi is one the most important festival, this four-day festival is celebrated across all three valleys of Bumburet, Rumbur, and Berir. Chilam Joshi begins with "Milk day" which, Kailash people store from household to offer their libation on the day of the festival. They ask for the blessing of God and pray for a prosperous year of agriculture, health, and safety of their herds. The main purpose of this festival is that Kailash men and women can find a spouse for themselves to get married. The women wear traditional attire with lively colors whereas, men wear traditional Shalwar Kameez with a waistcoat made of wool.

Uchal or Utchal

Uchal, also known as Utchal is a summer Kailash festival. During



The festival celebrated in annual harvesting with singing, dancing and paying homage to the nature for blessing them with good food and fruits. It is marked in the barley and wheat harvest season every year in August. Kailash people prepare cornbread, buttermilk, and cheese to celebrate the festival. They wear their traditional black robes, ornate cowries shelled headdresses and adorned with coloured necklaces and dance in a circle. During the festival, prayers and processions are held at a high plateau outside the village in Balangkuru, where the long night of dancing begins. The Uchal festival continues for several days and moving on to different locations within the valley.

Choimus is the winter festival, from 8-21 December, the most important celebration of the winter solstice and the return of the sun. Everyone wears new clothes, dance, feasts, and offer sacrifices. The first week of Choimus is for the Kailash people only. It is celebrated by feasting until the elders, who sit on a hilltop, watching the sun reaching the orbit, declare the beginning of the New Year. In the second week of Choimus, people show gratitude to their god with dance, music, and the sacrifice of goats. This part of a festival is public. It is dedicated to the god Balimain who is believed to visit from the mythical homeland of the Kailash, Tsyam, for the duration of the feast. Food sacrifices are offered at the clans' Jeshtak shrines, dedicated to the ancestors.





Savannas, wetlands and wildlife

A safari tour and a cowboy ride in one trip? One may not easily find these two different experiences in one travel destination, but it is possible in Colombia's eastern region



Orinoquía, known as the Wild East of Colombia, is characterized by vast tropical savannas, offering tourists an experience of hacienda life, complete with llaneros lessons in horse riding, cattle herding and milking.

It is also home to the mighty stream Raudal de Maypures (Maipures Rapids), dubbed as the 'Eight Wonder of the World' by German explorer Alexander von Humboldt in the 19th century.

Colombia's rich biodiversity provides visitors with a wide range of natural options of places to visit and things to experience. Orinoquia is the perfect spot for wildlife enthusiasts and those interested in exploring and discovering the various fauna of the country. Tourists can enjoy sightseeing while occasionally interacting with the Sabanero deer, the chigüiro, the Orinoco caiman, the four-nosed viper (Bothrops asper), the red cocora or tigers, monkeys, and if one is fearless, anacondas. Like the other regions, Orinoquia also hosts more than 300 bird species, thanks


to its lush forests.

The variety of ecosystems in the region provides a home to diverse amphibians and mammals. Birdwatchers can enjoy guans, curassows, screamers, eagles, and ducks. The savannas host white-tailed deer, armadillos, tapir, and peccaries, while pumas and jaguars widely inhabit the woodlands.

The region is also home to the only protected area under Colombia's Natural Parks system in the eastern plains. The El Tuparro Natural Park, a biosphere reserve located at the Vichada Department, is home to 74 species of mammals, 320 birds (many of them marine), 17 reptiles, 26 fish, and five primate species. Some of the most common endemic species that can be spotted in the park are top predators in the food chain, such as the jaguar, the jaguarundi [Puma yagouaroundi] and the forest fox [Cerdocyon thous].

Other major tourist destinations in the area include the Amacayacu National Natural Park, Eastern plains, Sierra de la Macarena, and Mavecure. It is the ideal destination for those who wish to hike the mountains of Serranía del or experience the cool water cascading from the waterfalls in Jirijirimo.

Colombia has emerged as a strong player in the global tourism landscape, bringing forward its diversity and wide range of untouched and protected natural areas. Recently, the country has been advancing its sustainable tourism initiatives while adding adventure and health tourism to its offerings.

From trains to digital worlds, a museum-hotel and more, Japan has museums to inspire the whole family





Do the Locomotion at the Railway Museum

Japan may be famous for its Shinkansen Bullet trains, but the history of rail travel in the country goes much further back. Stepping into the vast spaces of the Railway Museum in Omiya in Saitama City is enough to strike joy into the heart of any locomotion enthusiast, but this isn't just for trainspotters. The scale, historical trains, simulators, model railways and interactive displays are as exciting for children as they are for adults of all ages, bringing to life the golden age of train travel, and what's still to come in the future.

Different zones take visitors on journeys through different periods of locomotive heritage. The Rolling Stock Station showcases 36 different trains, including Locomotive No. 1, the first train to run





when railways first started operating in Japan in 1872, as well as historical shinkansen bullet trains.

Try your hand at driving a miniature train on a 300-metre course, following signals and speed limits, and keeping your passengers safe. Experience the thrill of driving the Series E5 Shinkansen with a life-like simulator that plays live-action video simulating the real speed - all 320 kilometres per hour of it.

Dive into an immersive of Encyclopaedias, brought to life at the new Zukan Museum Ginza

Instead of flipping through the pages of an encyclopaedia, Ginza's new Zukan Museum brings the world of encyclopaedias to life through revolutionary digital experiences that immerse visitors into natural worlds filled with creatures. 




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
